Late Blight Resistant

Grow your own tomato transplants (any variety) or purchase from a trusted grower to ensure a healthy start next season. Tomato varieties **Mountain Magic**, **Plum Regal** and **Legend** are three varieties with resistance or tolerance to this blight. Visit vegvariety.cce.cornell.edu and type **Legend** in the search box, click on the Legend tomato link and hit the search button next to seed sources to find places selling seeds to gardeners. Seeds for the other two varieties are not readily available to gardeners but you may find transplants of these varieties in local nurseries.

New Vegetable Varieties for 2010

The following varieties are new releases. We are holding off adding them to our list of recommended varieties until we hear from you. Will these do well in our NYS gardens? Grow these then share your opinions via <http://vegvariety.cce.cornell.edu/>

Bean, Pole ‘Trionfo Violetto’: Purple pole bean. Southern European variety with 7-inch, slender, oval-rounded pods with brown beans. Pods turn green when cooked. Also known as 'Trionfo' and 'Purple Trionfo Violetto'.

Lettuce ‘Skyphos’: Vibrant dark red butterhead type. Attractive large round lettuce heads are 6 to 8 inches in diameter. Good heat tolerance. Suitable for spring, summer or fall crops. Harvest in 47 days.

Pepper ‘Key West’: Hybrid sweet frying type. Plants bear long, tapered, lime-green, cubanelle fruit maturing to red. Resistant to bacterial leaf spot virus 1, 2 and 3.

Pepper ‘Naga Jolokia’ (aka Bhut jolokia): Extremely hot pepper from India. Large, bushy plants bear 2 1/2-inch, pencil-thick fruit that ripens to red. Also known as Nagahari, Bhut Jolokia, Bih Jolokia, Borbih, Raja Mircha, Raja Chilli, Mirch, Mircha, Naga Moresh, Naga Morich, Tezpur, and Dorset Naga (Naga Dorset).

Pepper ‘Pinot Noir’: Hybrid sweet pepper. Plants bear large, blocky, thick-walled, light green fruit that ripen to yellow, red finally purple as they ripen. Sets fruit in cool as well as in hot, humid conditions.

The following are new varieties are being distributed to wholesalers so seeds might harder to find:

Basil ‘Aristotle’: F1 hybrid. Compact Greek basil with a dense, bushy, rounded habit that requires no pinching to maintain shape. Can reach 12 inches tall, but harvesting of the small, highly fragrant leaves is recommended at about 6"(around 60 days from sowing). Perfect for containers, window boxes, patio or small gardens. (2010 release)

Eggplant ‘Ivory’: F1 Hybrid. Compact determinate plant with a multi branching habit. Grows 18 to 24 inches in garden or containers. Staking is required. Produces large numbers of white oval shaped 5 to 7 ounce fruit about the size of a baseball. Harvest 126 days from sowing seed. (2010 release)

Gourd ‘Bule Blister’: Vigorous vines spread 15 to 35 feet and produce a tan colored ornamental gourd for drying. Mature gourds will be 6 to 8 inches tall and 5 to 6 inches in diameter and will weigh from 1 to 3 pounds. Shape resembles a large apple covered with small warts or tooth-like bumps. Harvest in 100 to 120 days. (2010 release)

Melon ‘Sancho’: F1 Hybrid. Specialty melon produces 6- to 9-pound fruit with golden green skin and creamy white flesh. Harvest in 90 days. (2009 release)

Pepper ‘Burning Bush’: F1 Hybrid. ‘Chichen Itza.’ Early maturing habanero that produces a milder orange elongated lantern shaped fruit weighing about 2 ounces, measure 3 by 1.5 inches. Begin harvest 85 days from transplant.

Pepper ‘Chablis’: F1 Hybrid. The 1.5 foot tall early maturing plants produce a blocky shaped, thick walled, white to orange to scarlet red, 4 inches long and 3 inches wide bell pepper. Resistant to Tobacco Mosaic virus and Bacterial Spot virus. Harvest in 60 days.

Pepper ‘Classic’: F1 Hybrid. Plants are 3 feet tall and produce thick-walled green to red bell peppers with smooth, flat shoulders and even lobes. Disease resistance to Bacterial Leaf Spot 1, 2 & 3. Harvest 80 days from sowing seed.

Pepper ‘Jalafuego’: F1 Hybrid. Vigorous plant that produces a very hot jalapeño that is extra long and large, smooth, and very dark green. Tolerant to bacterial spot and potato virus Y. Harvest 65-72 days. (2009 release)

Spinach ‘El Grinta’: F1 Hybrid. Dark green color, thick leaf spinach. Best for baby or juvenile harvest in 25 warm days and 39 cool days. Slow bolting, resistant to race 10 Downey mildew. (2009 release)

Squash, Summer ‘Creole’ (SSX6550): F1 Hybrid. Plant has small spines. Medium-dark, cylindrical shaped, 7 inch long green fruit. (2008 release)

Squash, Winter ‘Quantum’: F1 Hybrid. Butternut squash plant with strong vigorous vine. Uniform size and shape 3 to 5 pound fruits have a smooth tan colored exterior and a bright orange interior with a thick neck and a small seed cavity. Harvest 100 to 110 days from sowing seed.

Tomato 'Basket Boy Yellow': F1 Hybrid. Yellow cherry size (2-inch, 3-ounce) fruit. Good for container gardens including hanging baskets. Harvest in 65 days. Tolerant to Verticillium Wilt (V1) and Fusarium Wilt F1 and F2. (2009 release)

Tomato F1 'Marmara': F1 Hybrid. Indeterminate, needs staking, Marmande type tomato. Oblate shaped 3 to 4 inch red tomatoes weigh 5 to 6 ounces with smooth ridged green shoulders. Tolerant to Tomato Mosaic Virus, Verticillium Wilt race 1, and Fusarium Wilt race 1. Harvest in 75 to 80 days.

Tomato 'Sweet 'n' Neat Cherry Red': F1 Hybrid. Dwarf determinate multi branching tomato suitable for containers, window boxes, patio or small gardens. Produces 1 inch round cherry red fruits weigh less than an ounce. Staking is required for the vines reaching 12 to 14 inches. Harvest about 60 days.

Tomato 'Sweet Treats': F1 Hybrid. Indeterminate 6-foot plant requires staking. Cherry tomato with deep pink tone. Resistance to Tomato Mosaic Virus strains 0 & 1, Fusarium 1 & 2, and leaf mold. Tolerant to cracking, gray leaf spot and crown rot and root rot. Harvest 105-120 days from sowing seed.
